REFLECTION

1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

Is Christ divided? (1 Corinthians 1:13)

Today is the final day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. For the past week, believers from virtually every Christian tradition have been praying for an end to all division among Christians: an end to the division between the Orthodox, Protestant, and Catholic churches; an end to divisions between Orthodox, Protestant, and Catholic believers; and an end to divisions within churches and parishes.

What a perfect reading, then, to close out this week! In it, we get a glimpse of St. Paul's inspired insights into causes of division. When he learns that factions are threatening the church at Corinth, he goes right to the heart of the problem. "Is Christ divided?" he asks, almost sarcastically (1 Corinthians 1:13). In other words, How can you take sides like this when you were all baptized into the one Lord, Jesus Christ?

Paul understood that divisions happen when we focus too much on our own opinions and selfish desires and not enough on Jesus. We might favour one church leader over another (1 Corinthians 1:12). We might prefer our wealthy brothers and sisters over those who are struggling (11:18-22). Or we might be more impressed with those who seem spiritually gifted and less so with the ones who seem "ordinary" (12:4-7). But in each case, one crucial truth gets obscured: "In one Spirit we were all baptized into one body," the body of Christ (12:13).

Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, former preacher to the papal household, once said, "If we will turn to Christ and go forward together toward him, we Christians will draw closer to each other" (Sermon, March 18, 2016). The closer we get to Jesus, the more he heals our wounds and leads us to repentance. And the more we are healed and forgiven, the easier it becomes to love and reconcile with each other.

No, Christ is not divided. So, let's all draw closer to him and ask him to make us one!

ADULT CATECHISM

The Catholic Church is Synodal Church
[snippets from the Final Document of the Synod on Synodality]

In a Plurality of Contexts

53. The call to renewed relationships in the Lord Jesus flourishes in the different contexts in which His disciples live and carry out the Church's mission. The plurality of cultures requires that the uniqueness of each cultural context is taken into account. However, all cultures are also marked by distorted relationships that are not in keeping with the Gospel. Throughout history, these relational failures have turned into structures of sin (cf. SRS 36), which in turn shape the way people think and act. In particular, structures of sin create obstacles and generate fear. We need to face these in order to set out on the road to the conversion of relationships in the light of the Gospel.

54. The evils that plague our world, including wars and armed conflicts and the illusion that just peace can be achieved by force, are rooted in these dynamics. Just as destructive is the belief that all of creation, and this includes humans themselves, can be exploited at will for profit. A consequence of this reality is the creation of barriers that divide, including amongst Christian communities, resulting in inequalities whereby some have possibilities that are denied to others. These are inequalities such as between men and women, racial prejudices, caste divisions, discrimination against people with disabilities, violation of the rights of minorities of all kinds and the reluctance to accept migrants. Even our relationship with our mother and sister earth (cf. LS 1), bears the mark of a fracture that endangers the lives of countless communities, particularly among those most poor, if not entire peoples and perhaps all of humanity. The most radical and dramatic rejection is that of human life itself; this leads to the discarding of the unborn, as well as of the elderly.



WE MIGHT AS WELL KNOW: Have you ever wondered why the Gospel Book is lifted high and carried to the ambo before reading? The priest or deacon lifts the Gospel Book high and carries it in procession to the ambo. This is not a practical movement. It is a public declaration. The Gospel is not just one reading among many. It is Christ Himself speaking to His people. By lifting the book, the Church proclaims that the words about to be spoken come from above, not from human opinion or reflection. This gesture mirrors ancient royal custom. When a king's message was carried into a city, it was lifted high so all could see. In the same way, the Gospel is elevated because the King is about to speak. There is also deep Eucharistic symbolism. Just as the Body of Christ is lifted on the altar, the Word of Christ is lifted in the assembly. The Church honours both with the same reverence, teaching that Christ is truly present in His Word and in the Sacrament. The procession itself matters. The Gospel does not come quietly or privately. It moves through the people, reminding us that the Word of God is meant to be heard, carried, and lived, not kept hidden. When incense and candles accompany the Gospel Book, the meaning deepens. What is about to be proclaimed is sacred. Heaven listens. The Church stands. So when you see the Gospel Book raised and carried with care, understand what is happening: Christ is about to speak, and the Church lifts Him high before the world.

Promoting Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in the Parish

Key Aspects of Adoration:

Real Presence: Based on the belief that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist, making it a personal encounter with God.

The Monstrance: The host is placed in a monstrance (from Latin monstrare, "to show") for public viewing and adoration.

Silent Prayer: A time for quiet contemplation, focusing on Jesus, often involving silent prayer, reading Scripture, singing hymns, or praying the Rosary.

Benediction: A formal closing ritual where the priest blesses the people with the Blessed Sacrament.

How to Participate

Enter Reverently: Approach the altar slowly, genuflect (kneel on the right knee) as a sign of respect.

Be Present: Sit or kneel quietly, focusing on Jesus' presence in the Eucharist.

Pray: Use prayers like the Jesus Prayer ("Lord Jesus, have mercy on me, a sinner"), Psalms, or simply talk to Jesus from your heart.

Bring Your Needs: Present your joys, sorrows, fears, and hopes to Him.

Leave with Gratitude: Thank Jesus for His presence and gift.

Adoration fosters a deeper connection with Christ, offering graces, healing, and spiritual strength, akin to spending time with a beloved spouse or friend.
